## **1 Day Performance RDS Class** (Tuesday or Wednesday)

This course is a deep dive into the understandings of efficiency with a handgun and the application of speed and accuracy. With a heavy emphasis on performance on demand and individual diagnosis, shooters should leave this class with an understanding of what they're doing incorrectly, how to fix it, how to train moving forward and how to effect change within their own dept



## **Romeo Concepts**

### **Practical Pistol for Law Enforcement:** (Tuesday or Wednesday)

A pistol course designed to help the student refine the fundamentals of marksmanship. We review the fundamentals, then we focus on helping the student improve their overall performance by showing them how to shoot sooner rather than faster. We learn to be efficient with the fundamentals and how to reduce tension. The students will learn how to achieve repeatable repetitions and understand what costs them time or leads to inconsistencies in their fundamentals. This course prioritizes grip, sights, and trigger and explains how each is essential to the shooting process. Each student will understand how and why specific techniques work for movement. We combine the movement techniques in competition and integrate them with tactics utilized in a shoot house. The student's job is to understand what their pistol is doing and why they are receiving the results they are getting.

This course is physically demanding, and each student should arrive in good physical shape, ready to push and move aggressively with their pistol.

Minimum requirements/recommendations

- Handgun with at least three magazines
- Reliable gun belt (IWB or OWB) with a reliable holster (No Serpa, Nylon or Leather holsters)
  - At least one magazine holder
    - Eye protection
    - Hearing protection
    - 1200 rounds
    - Reliable tourniquet
    - IFAK (recommended)
  - Notepad and pen (recommended)
  - Sunscreen (recommended)
    - Water and snacks
    - Black Sharpie
  - Appropriate range clothing

# Dallas Greer Kentucky State Police

## Warrant Service Planning and Decision-Making (8 hours KLEC): (Tuesday or Wednesday)

This course will provide sworn personnel with a structured overview of warrant service operations through the framework of decision-making, planning, and tactical methodology. Instruction will begin at the philosophical foundation of warrant service operations with emphasis on critical thinking concepts, and then transition into strategic planning models and tactical application considerations associated with warrant execution. Topics include risk analysis, controlling objective, the safety priorities, PIETO, the Commander's Decision Analysis Framework, and the 7-step warrant service process. This course will assist you in establishing proven processes on how to safely and effectively execute a warrant, defining a "high-risk" warrant & when to call SWAT, and planning for the "Big 4" contingencies. This course is lecture-based and informational in nature and does not include practical, hands-on training.

Instructor Bio: Captain Dallas Greer is an 18 year veteran of the Kentucky State Police, beginning his career in September 2007. He graduated from the KSP Academy in February 2008 as a member of Cadet Class 86. Following graduation, he was assigned to Post 9 Pikeville, where he served on patrol from 2008 to 2011. He was briefly assigned to Post 10 Harlan in 2011 before being selected for the KSP Special Response Team. While on SRT, he served as an assaulter, breacher, and less-lethal specialist. In 2019, he promoted to Sergeant and remained assigned to SRT, serving as both the team's Assistant Tactical Commander and Tactical Commander until 2022. During this time, he also held the position of KSP Crowd Management Coordinator, helping to coordinate state-wide equipment purchases, training, and field operations for the agency's post-level crowd management teams. In 2022, he promoted to Lieutenant and was assigned to the Special Operations Branch (SRT, HDU, & K9) in the role of Assistant Commander. In 2023, he was given a field-promotion and assumed the role of Commander for the Special Operations Branch. In 2025, he was promoted to Captain and remained assigned to the Special Operations Branch where he currently serves.

Captain Greer is a recipient of the KSP Bravery Award (2016), as well as a team-recipient of the KTOA's Unit Citation of Valor (2022) and Award of Valor (2022). He was a member of KSP SRT's 2012 KTOA SWAT Competition 1<sup>st</sup> Place team. He previously served on the Kentucky Tactical Officers Association Board of Directors from January 2014-December 2019, serving in every executive board position during his time on the KTOA Board.

A 2003 graduate of Bell County High School, Captain Greer earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Education from the University of Kentucky in 2007. He was a 4-year member and 2-year letterman for the University of Kentucky Wildcat football team, playing for the Wildcats from 2003-2007. He is a member of the 2006 Music City Bowl Championship team, and – upon graduation in 2007 – was inducted into the University of Kentucky's prestigious Frank G. Hamm Society of Character.

# The Full Proof K9 Project

## **K9 Integration with Tactical Teams** (Tuesday and Wednesday)

- Handlers will be able to identify and define the difference between reality based vs. scenario-based training exercises.
- Handlers will demonstrate their ability to triage runs and develop a search plan with a tactical team.
- Handlers will be able to identify their most effective roll and location within a tactical team during a building search (perimeter containment vs. entry team).
- Handlers will identify the layering of technology / less lethal options prior to, and during a tactical team entry.
- Handlers will identify CDC principles (clear down and cover) when deploying with a tactical team.
- Handlers will be able to identify and demonstrate proper threat assessment principles as it relates to a K9 locating and/or engaging a suspect.
- Handlers will be able to identify and define the difference between tracking vs. trailing vs. open area searches.

- Handlers will be able to identify the rolls and responsibilities of tactical teams (search formations) as it relates to a track, trail, or open area search deployment.
- Handlers will be able to demonstrate their ability to formulate a plan prior to, and during a K9 track, trail, or open area search using the information and/or intelligence gathered.
- Handlers will identify the layering of technology / less lethal options prior to, and during a tactical team search.
